1. TWO HEADS ARE BETTER THAN ONE


This activity will allow you to apply active listening and assertive communication to understand different perspectives regarding community problems. Learning to see the way others see a problem that is affecting everyone will help you get a deeper understanding not only of the problem itself, but also of the people who are giving their opinion. In order to find a solution to a problem, you need to have effective communication, which requires you to listen first and understand the point of view of the other person so you can later give your own opinion and find a solution together.

Materials

- Printed handout
- Pen

STEP BY STEP

- 1 If possible, print the handout on the next page or copy it on your notebook so you can work on it.
- 2 In pairs, brainstorm problems that you find in your community, maybe at school, or in your neighborhood. Each student chooses a different problem.



3 Create a short debate about the problem you chose. You have to find a solution for the problem. Choose roles. Decide who is going to speak first. Student A, present your problem and then your proposal. Student B, listen attentively. If necessary, take notes using the space on the handout. Student B, before giving your opinion and proposal, repeat in your own words what Student A proposed. Student B, you can only give your opinion and proposal on Student A's problem after Student A makes sure that you paraphrased correctly what he / she said. Student A, you can only give permission to Student B to proceed once you are sure that Student B understood what you said. Student B, present your proposal and opinion on Student A's proposal.

- **4** Now, *Student B* presents his or her problem and *Student A* does what *Student B* did before.
- **5** Discuss as a class:
 - a How fast did you find the best solution for your problem? Why?
 - **b** Do you think you would have found a better solution by yourself? Why?
 - **c** Why do you think it is important to make sure you understand what others are saying?

ACTING IN FAVOR OF OUR SOCIETY 2. FINDING A WAY

When we're in the midst of identifying a problem and giving a solution, we find different perspectives that come from the people involved. This activity will help you to identify your own emotions when facing opinions that are different from yours, and how these emotions can affect your behavior. Always try to remember that each person has his / her own thoughts, and those are valuable and deserve respect as much as yours. Don't try to force a change of mind, but be open to new ideas. We have the capacity to place ourselves into another's position, thus we are able to solve conflicts by considering the other party stance, not only ours.

Materials

STEP BY STEP

1 Work in pairs. Make a list of the problems that global warming has caused in your community.

2 Discuss with your partner which problem can be ranked as the most important one.

I think that using products packaged in plastic is the most important issue to solve.

But I consider drying out of soil as the most relevant one.

- 3 Take some time to discuss your answers and get to an agreement on the ranking of problems. Identify your emotions while exposing your points of view, especially when your opinions are different from your classmate's. Then find a solution to each problem you listed.
- **4** After listening attentively to your partner's opinions, reflect on the conflicts that may have arisen from the discussion, and use the guide on the next page to solve them.
- **5** As a class, discuss the following questions:
 - **a** Did any conflict arise when you were trying to prioritize the main problem? Did you come to an agreement?
 - **b** Did you expose your points of view to your partner? Did your partner listen attentively to your arguments?
 - c When you were listening to a different opinion from yours, how did you feel? Do you think you tried to understand your partner's thinking from his / her point of view?
 - **d** Reflect on the way you behaved when you exposed your point of view. Do you think your emotions affected your behavior? Did you try to fiercely change your partner's mind? Why or why not?

Guide to Resolving Conflicts

Identify the problem		
Describe the problem. Ask your partner how he / she is feeling about it. Discuss what you both consider has caused the situation.		Final analysism to math an
		Find a solution together
		Think of ideas to solve the conflict and choose one. Each person is responsible for his / her own behavior and has the ability to change it. Resolving conflicts is not about changing another person's perspective, but to understand it.
Take responsibility		
Once you have shared your perspective about the conflict, think about how you may have contributed to the conflict. Ask yourself what		
you could have done differently, and what you will do different from now on.		
	7	Come to an end
		It is suggested to end the conflict with a kind word. Remember to be thankful to your partner for being open with you, and express confidence that your relationship will be better for having talked the problem out and not to hold resentments for any past conflicts.



ACTING IN FAVOR OF OUR SOCIETY 3. A STORY OF SOLIDARITY

Sometimes understanding others is the most important way to create solidarity. Rather than running out to help someone in need before we understand the nature of their problem, it's better to listen and understand so we can truly be of use to the other person. Sometimes when we have not walked in someone else's shoes first, we might do more harm to the afflicted person. When we listen and understand, we can create a community with a strong sense of comradeship and solidarity. Listen, understand, and then help to make your community better.

Material

Printed handout

STEP BY STEP

- 1 If possible, print or photocopy the handout on the next page so you can work on it.
- 2 Work in groups. Sit down in a circle. One student chooses one of the characters and their story from the next page. Then, that same student goes into the center of the circle and tells the rest of the group the problem the character has. Make it fun! Role-play it!
- 3 Taking turns, each classmate offers help to the student in the middle. Whenever there is someone presenting a problem, the rest must listen attentively and be as empathetic as possible. Once everyone has offered a solution, as a group, decide which would be the best solution for the character's problem. Give reasons why that solution is the most helpful and kind. Choose another student to move to the center of the circle.
- **4** Repeat the exercise of choosing a character and suggesting a solution to their problem until everyone has had a turn.
- **5** Discuss in groups:
 - a How did you feel when you were the character in trouble? Why?
 - **b** Do you think your classmates understood your situation and offered help accordingly? Why?
 - **c** What do you think is important when helping others?
 - **d** Who was the person that gave the best solutions? Why?

ACTING IN FAVOR OF OUR SOCIETY 4. UNDERSTANDING OTHERS

Experiences and backgrounds make people different from each other, and those differences cause them to see things differently from us. This activity will allow you to explore the differences between the background of different people so you can try to understand how others think and different perspectives. In this way you can also discover how the diversity of perspectives can benefit a community.

Materials

- Printed handout
- Pen

STEP BY STEP

- 1 If possible, print or photocopy the handout on the next page so you can work on it.
- **2** Work in groups of five. You are going to role-play a situation in which, as a group, you will have to decide the fate of a nature reserve. Choose a character from the next page and read the details of the problem.
- 3 Once you all have understood the problem and the character you chose. write your character's argument in favor of or against the situation. Don't forget to give reasons for your argument.

- **4** Take turns presenting your arguments. Present your perspective clearly and respectfully. The other participants should listen attentively. When it is your turn to talk, you can add comments to what your classmates said.
- **5** Discuss as a class:
 - a Was it hard to reach an agreement? Why?
 - **b** Did everyone respect each other's perspective?
 - c Do you think the decision would have been the same if the committee was formed only by ecologists or merchants? Why?
 - **d** Is diversity important to help a community grow? Why?
